Friday's Scriptures

Haggai 1:15-2:9 Psalm 42:1-4 Luke 9:18-22

A short reflection on the Gospel.

People thought they knew who Jesus was. e.g., John the Baptist or Elijah or one of the ancient prophets. Jesus could easily be confused for being one of these people. John the Baptist, for example was his cousin, they probably looked similar, and their message was similar. Some believed that John the Baptist was the Messiah. It may have been easier to believe that Jesus was a prophet, than the Messiah, the Christ. If Jesus was the Christ, then everything would change for them. He was the one who they had been waiting for to free and save their people.
